

CALUMET COUNTRY CLUB

*** A 1901 Donald Ross design ***

Established in 1901, Calumet Country Club has a deep and long tradition in the history of Chicagoland golf.

The private 18-hole championship golf course was designed by one of the most renowned architects of the 20th century, Donald Ross. Throughout the years, many of Ross' designs have hosted major golf championships. A few of Ross' most famous courses include Pinehurst #2, Seminole, Oak Hill, Inverness and Oakland Hills.

Calumet boasts a storied tournament-hosting history of its own, having put on the 1924 Western Open



and the 1945 Chicago Victory Open. The latter was won by Byron Nelson as part of his record-setting 11 consecutive and 18 total victories in 1945.

The venerable layout will undergo two modifications for the Illinois State Amateur. First, the Championship routing will begin with the par-5 6th hole in an effort to limit congestion around the regular first and 10th tees. Secondly, the par-71 track will play as a par-70, as the 485-yard par-5 fifth hole (normally Calumet's No. 10) will be a par-4 for the event.

Calumet will play at 6,619 yards and will significantly test State Am golfers with back-to-front sloped and fast greens, as well as strategically placed bunkers, water hazards and narrow tree lined fairways. At the 2016 CDGA Amateur Championship, no golfers were under par after the event's 36 holes of stroke play qualifying.
